On behalf of the students, Board of Education, administration, faculty and staff of the Sheffield-Sheffield Lake City School District—and the many friends of the district who supported, contributed to and/or took part in the campaign to approve Issue 15—we'd like to say thank you to the voters. We believe you changed our school district, and perhaps our community, for the better on May 3rd.

Your willingness to sacrifice for the good of our children and our community and approve our 4.94-mill, \$31,000,000 bond issue is appreciated very much. Our new building for Brookside High School and Sheffield Middle School students—together with the remodeling of the current BHS building to adapt it to the needs of students in grades four, five and six—you will have given us the means to replace half of our aging and inadequate school buildings when the doors to our new building in about 30 months' time.

We've been working in consultation with our architects, MKC Associates, on plans for our new building for nearly three years. We'd like to use MKC's expertise, the well-informed opinions of our administrators, faculty, staff and students combined with the desires of the community at large to make our new school fit our needs and to make it distinctively representative of Sheffield Village and Sheffield Lake. To that end, we hope you will attend our next community meeting, at 6:30 p.m. June 22nd at SMS and let us know what's important to you. Obviously we can't make everyone's wish come true, but we certainly want to take everyone's opinion into consideration—and try to answer everyone's questions to the best of our ability—during this planning phase of building our new school district.

Construction of our new building, like all big construction projects, will be subject to the usual vagaries such as weather delays and the availability of construction materials and labor. We are concentrating on our site now, and the next year will be spent arranging financing, obtaining all the necessary permits and approvals, designing the building, advertising for bids and awarding contracts to the lowest and best bidders. We hope to break ground and begin construction (when the weather permits us to begin) next spring. We hope to move students into the new building some time during the 2013-14 school year.

Our district has made great progress the last few years, having progressed from state mandated "fiscal emergency" status to a state of fiscal stability. We've progressed academically from "continuous improvement" to "effective" status and several of our schools have earned "excellent" ratings from the state. We've worked hard to improve our facilities by using all available sources of alternative funding including grants and donations and the dedicated labor of many volunteers from the community. We believe our recent improvements and the opportunity to provide new buildings for our students foreshadows many improvements in our future. We appreciate your trust and we intend to continue to be good stewards of the community's money and resources. We will succeed. Cardinal Pride, Community Wide has never been more apparent than it is now.

STATE OF THE DISTRICT

Things continue to go well for the district. We have completed a great year. Another senior class has graduated. They will definitely be missed as the class was very special.

We are currently in the process of starting the initial paperwork part of the high school, middle school construction process. We are seeking and appreciative of any and all community input into the process. We have scheduled a public meeting for the purpose of getting input Wednesday evening, June 22 at 6:30 in the middle school cafeteria.

Although the weather has delayed some of our efforts, such as the practice fields and the track surface, progress continues. The new exercise room is pretty close to schedule and will be open for use soon. The Safe Routes to School project has been delayed by bureaucratic red tape, but hopefully will be ready for the start of the school year in the fall.

We are looking at several means to improve our test scores. We are restructuring our Title One reading program. We are in the process of updating our Five Year Strategic Plan. I would like to extend a special thank you to the many individuals who have helped in the process (25 community people, 21 staff, and 19 administrators/board members). The final plan will be completed, approved, and released by the start of the school year. Reviewing and revising our curriculum continues to be an ongoing process.

The year has been busy, but also very productive. It has been a good year, but the upcoming years look to be even better. -WF

NEW BUILDING FINANCES BEGIN

Thank you for your support of the School District's Bond Issue passed in the May 3rd election. The next few years will be an exciting time for us all as we see our new building taking shape.

The Treasurer's office involvement is related to the financial details necessary to receive the bond issue proceeds. We must create an Official Statement presenting the School District's financial condition. The Official Statement along with our presentation to the credit rating agencies will establish the credit rating for the School District. In turn, the credit rating will be important in determining the interest rate we pay on the bonds. The lower the interest rate is the better for the School District.

The financial process will take four to five months with the bond proceeds of \$31,000,000 being received in October. The bond proceeds will be invested and used to pay construction costs over the time needed to complete the construction of our new building.

The bond issue proceeds are for the purpose of constructing, renovating, remodeling, rehabilitating, adding to, furnishing, equipping and otherwise improving school district buildings and facilities.

WILSON CERTIFICATION IN READING & WRITING

Becoming Wilson Certified is not easy. These teachers began work in November, completed over 60 full lessons of instruction, had to develop and maintain an appropriate Teacher Notebook and student notebook in accordance with Wilson Language program standards. They had to demonstrate mastery of lesson plan procedures, an understanding of language concepts through accurate teaching with multisensory procedures, and had to compete the Advanced Strategies for MSL (multi-sensory language Instruction) WRS Group Mastery. Much of this work was completed outside the regular workday, working one on one with students selected using the Wilson criteria.

The Wilson Reading System (WRS) is a research-based reading and writing program. It is a complete curriculum for teaching decoding and encoding (spelling) beginning with phoneme segmentation. WRS directly teaches the structure of words in the English language so that students master the coding system for reading and spelling.

This reading program doesn't overwhelm the student with rules; it presents the language system of English in a systematic and cumulative manner that makes it much easier for kids to manage. It provides an organized, sequential system (with extensive controlled text) to help teachers implement a multisensory structured language program. The basic purpose of WRS is to help students develop fluent decoding and encoding skills—to the level of mastery. From the beginning steps of the program, it also includes sight word instruction, fluency, vocabulary, expressive oral language development and comprehension. Throughout the program, a ten-part lesson plan (designed to be very interactive between teacher and student) is followed. The lessons progress from easier to more challenging tasks for decoding and then spelling.

These teachers have successfully completed all of the requirements and have received a WRS Level I Certificate from Wilson Language Training. They can now represent our District as Wilson Level I Certified Instructors.

NEW STATE STANDARDS FOR PRIMARY GRADES

The Ohio Department of Education has recently adopted the Common Core Standards which will be fully implemented in 2014. As the standards change for Ohio, so will the Assessments and the Local Report Card. Next year's kindergartners will be the first to take the new State assessments. As a result, we have held numerous grade level meetings to review the Common Core, and discuss what adjustments we will have to make to ensure our students will be prepared and we have the resources we need in the classroom. Our District is being very proactive in our approach to the new changes. The building principals and Director of Curriculum, attended a conference on using the new Core Standards that was hosted by Leadership and Learning - the presenter was one of the nation's leading authorities on academic standards, performance assessment and accountability, Doug Reeves. The PreK-grade 2 teachers will be using the new standards next year in language arts, math, social studies and science. OPERATIONS

NEW BUILDING TIME FRAME

A community meeting for residents to 'input' their suggestions regarding the design and amenities in the new school building will be held on Wednesday, June 22. All residents of Sheffield Village and Sheffield Lake are invited to the 6:30 p.m. meeting at SMS.

The June 22 meeting was preceded on June 9 by a meeting at which S-SL staff, including teachers, administrators, custodians, cooks, cleaners and others offered their input on the new building's needs in both high school and middle school classrooms, and another opportunity for school staff to make suggestions after the community meeting, at an all-day session, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on June 27.

Representatives of MKC Associates, Inc. (the Mansfield architecture firm that has been researching our needs and projected growth for almost three years) will be at all three meetings. MKC architects will work on the design schematics; design development and construction documentation of the new building through the rest of 2011 and spring of 2012, though early site preparation could begin this fall. Construction bids would be advertised in the spring of 2012, with construction to begin during the summer. As always, construction projects are subject to weather delays and other problems, but the new building should open early in 2014.

Voters approved a \$31,000,000, 34-year, 4.9-mill bond issue for the new building on May 3, giving us the means to move rapidly forward in our ongoing quest for excellence. We appreciate the voters' trust in allowing us to build for a future that will make our community proud. We vow to continue to be good stewards of the community's money and resources. We will succeed.

PROJECTS CONTINUE TO TAKE SHAPE

We've worked hard to improve our facilities through alternative funding, using grants, donations and any other available resources. Our new all-weather track installation is progressing after an unusually wet spring, and we hope it will be ready for use in the fall. Drainage and other improvements to Sevits Stadium, which include refurbishing and relocating the scoreboard, installation of new shot put and discus field event areas, new goalposts and the renovation of the field house to adapt it for use as a locker room facility for track and the installation of new chain link fencing to separate the running track from the area where football and soccer fans can walk around the gridiron or soccer field during games should all be ready in time for football and soccer home games this season.

The track will be made available to the community for walking, jogging, or running. Bikes, rollerblades, skates, and pets are not permitted on the track as they can damage the surface. We plan on hosting our first home track meet in decades this spring.

We're working with Ohio Edison to address some electrical issues at the stadium. We are also working with our friends at AMVETS Post 55 on a new flag post area. Post 55 members have offered to donate the labor and materials for that area, including the flagpole and flag. Thank you AMVETS.

We are also working with several community volunteers to improve or replace our current scoreboard.

The soon to be planted grass on our new practice fields (north of the stadium and east of the baseball diamond) should be ready for use by our boys and girls soccer teams, the SMS seventh and eighth grade football teams and the Cardinal Marching Band soon.

Construction of our new exercise room on the west side of BHS is underway and should be ready for use when school starts. The new exercise room is a much larger area than our old weight room, which was assembled (mainly for use by the football and wrestling teams) in the west end of the boys locker room.

These days many girls are interested in weight training and signing up for advanced phys. ed classes, so now we'll have an access door to the exercise room directly from the gym. The new room will accommodate our weight training equipment and much more.

Regular summer maintenance activities are in full swing. Roof repairs, parking lot repairs, painting, plumbing repairs, electrical upgrades, drainage improvements, and landscaping are ongoing.

And finally, the Safe Routes To School Grant-funded walkway down the west side of Harris Road from Oster Road to BHS and SMS is on Sheffield Village's agenda for construction this summer. At last report Mayor John Hunter said he was only waiting for Norfolk & Southern to sign off on KS Associates' design for the sidewalk crossing the tracks south of Oster before ordering the start of construction. We still hope to have that alternative to riding the bus available for students who prefer to walk or ride bikes by August 24 or soon after.

BARR PTO, ENDOWMENT FUND AND COUNTY TEAM UP FOR WALKING CLUB



The Barr PTO's After School Walking Club got off to a great start this spring despite the rainy weather. Some 40 fourth grade students joined the club 6 weeks before school ended. They met after school twice a week for 6 weeks. The first 6 walks were taken in the gym at Barr and around the school playground. When the weather began to clear, the final 6 meetings were scheduled for French Creek Nature Center trails (weather permitting.) The Lorain County Health Department provided \$480 for healthy snacks for every meeting. A \$350 Endowment Fund grant provided pedometers. The buses were free because it was all within the school district. Each meeting was divided into a walking warm-up, a snack session, a healthy living discussion (with emphasis on healthy eating, sleeping, hygiene, exercise tips and monitoring) and an exercise segment, either fast-paced walking or aerobic exercise. All students kept an exercise logbook to record their daily habits.

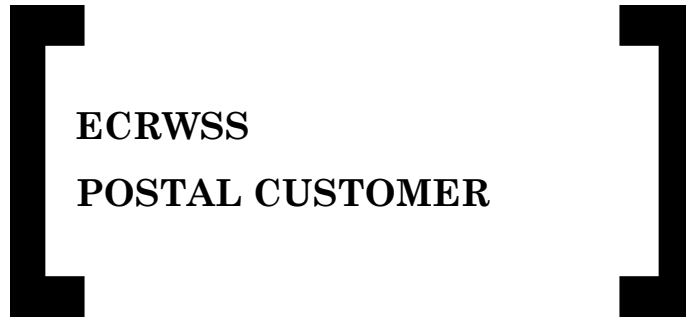

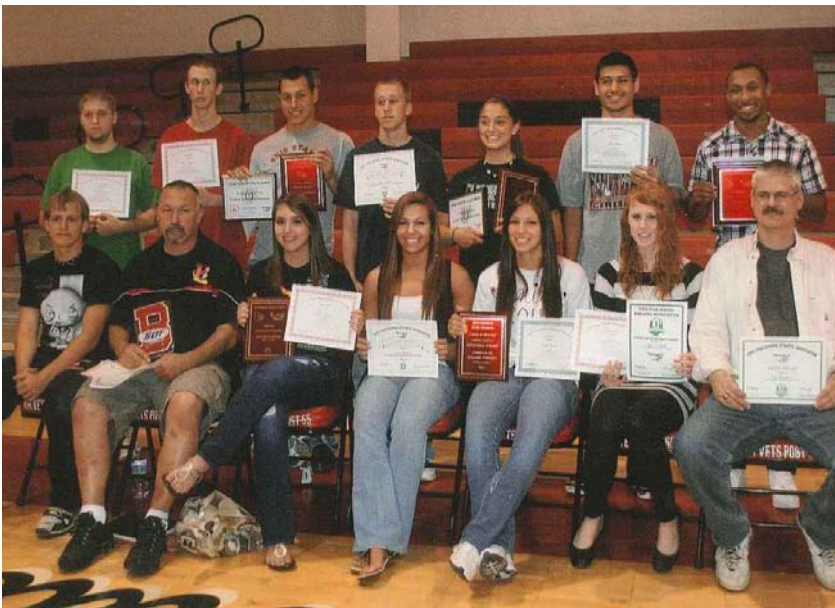
